
Be Ticket Smart

Online ticket scams are increasing, and it's important to learn how to stay safe, save money and keep sensitive information out of the hands of fraudulent operators.

Ticket scalpers are no longer standing outside venues wearing trench coats. The new counterfeit ticket sales industry is very savvy and often subtle. Scammers create realistic but fraudulent websites, duplicating the imagery and names of legitimate sites, making it hard for consumers to tell that they're fake. Other scams include selling counterfeit tickets, never sending the purchased tickets to buyers or even selling the same ticket to multiple people.

In response, Minnesota lawmakers recently passed legislation to add more consumer protections when buying tickets to concerts, sports and cultural events. The law goes into effect January 1, 2025. Here's what it contains:

Minnesota's Ticket Transparency Law





Buy Tickets Safely Online

- 1. Buy tickets directly from the venue. You can buy physical tickets at venues like the Ames Center box office in person.
- 2. Navigate from the venue website and use its ticketing link. For tickets at the Ames Center in Burnsville, you can add "Ticketmaster" to your Google search; this is the only site Ames uses for online ticket sales.
- 3. Double check the URL of the site you're buying from. Make sure it's a legitimate ticket sales vendor and not a copycat. Look for the padlock symbol in the browser window; this means the site is secure.
- 4. Never buy tickets before a tour has gone on sale. This is called "speculative ticketing" and it's now illegal in the state of Minnesota.
- 5. Buy resale tickets through reputable sites. Reputable large-name sites offer protection for your purchase, including third-party sales. Reputable sites, for example, sell verified resale tickets, clearly marking them with a different icon or color.

- 6. Be cautious when buying from third-party sites, since it's easy to replicate information already on the internet.
- 7. Exercise extreme caution when working with private resellers. If you contact someone on Craigslist or Facebook Marketplace, ask the seller to forward their original purchase confirmation email (not the actual ticket) to you before you pay them. Ensure it's an email forwarded from their account and not a doctored photo of a confirmation.
- 8. When buying online, use a credit card or PayPal's Goods and Services feature. Credit cards offer built-in fraud protection and PayPal offers purchase protection.
- 9. When you receive your ticket, check it closely. Ensure it's for the correct date, time and venue and that the seat actually exists.
- 10. Avoid taking and sharing screenshots of tickets on social media. Or if you do, cover the barcode. Scammers love to grab that data and create duplicates of tickets. (Cover your personal information too, to increase your own safety.)

Register to Vote



Tip: To help avoid long lines at the polls, register online at least 20 days before Election Day at <u>mnvotes.org</u>

You can also register at your polling place on Election Day or when you vote early with proof of residency by bringing one of these:

1. ID with current name and address

MN Driver's License, State ID or Learner's Permit (or receipt of any of these), Tribal ID with name, address, photo and signature -OR-

2. A registered voter from your precinct can go with you to the polling place and sign an oath confirming your address

You can pair an expired, out-of-state, school or military ID, or a U.S. passport or tribal ID without an address with a document that displays your current name and address like a utility bill, bank or credit card statement, rent or mortgage statement or residential lease.



Blue-Green Algae: When in Doubt, Keep Out



Blue-green algae bloom at Keller Lake

To have a safe and fun summer, make sure you know the health risks caused by harmful blue-green algae blooms.

Blue-green algae aren't actually algae but types of bacteria called cyanobacteria. Blue-green algae is present in lakes and ponds throughout the state. Levels vary seasonally, and they do not always produce harmful toxins. However, under the right conditions — like warm and calm weather — a harmful bloom can form. Toxins produced by the blue-green algae can make humans and animals sick, particularly if ingested, but also from skin contact. "When in doubt, keep out" — if you suspect a blue-green algae bloom stay out of the water.

A blue-green algae bloom may look like pea soup or spilled green paint. Not all blooms look the same or are the same density — they may float and form on the surface or be more distributed throughout the water.

Blue-green algae cannot be eliminated from a lake, but the harmful blooms are temporary. Changes in weather conditions (like cooling and wind) can cause a bloom to subside. A more long term solution to reduced frequency and intensity of algal blooms is reducing overall nutrient inputs that add phosphorous and nitrogen to bodies of water. Burnsville residents can help reduce the impact of algal blooms by reducing the amount of lawn clippings, fertilizers and pet waste that runoff of their lawns. A buffer strip, or unmowed area, between lawn and water can also help reduce the amount of nutrient runoff.

Only Rain in the Drain, Please

Every time it rains, the City storm drain system collects water running off of roofs, driveways, lawns, parking lots and roads. Most of this water drains directly into neighborhood ponds and lakes and eventually makes it to the Minnesota River. Unfortunately, this runoff also carries pollutants such as lawn fertilizers, pet waste, garbage and oil leaked from cars.

Join your neighbors in making sure that only rain gets washed down your storm drain. Here are a few simple things you can do:

Capture Rain at Home. Less runoff means fewer pollutants are washed into ponds, lakes and streams. Use a rain barrel or rain garden to collect runoff from your home and use it to water lawns and shrubs.

Pick up the Pieces. Pet waste is full of bacteria and nutrients. As the waste breaks down, runoff washes it into the storm water system and into ponds and lakes. Be a responsible pet owner and bag your dog's droppings.

Limit fertilizer use. Buy phosphorus-free fertilizer and reduce fertilizer use to prevent excess nutrients from entering lakes and ponds. As required by ordinance, do not apply fertilizer within 20 feet of any wetland, pond or lake.

Properly Dispose of Household Waste. Dumping pollutants, such as paint or motor oil, down a storm drain is against the law. Household hazardous waste can be taken to The Recycling Zone in Eagan (see below). If you see unusual water coloration or detect chemical odors coming from a storm drain, pond or lake, report it immediately to Public Works at 952-895-4550.

Reduce Fats, Oils & Grease (FOG) from **Entering Sewers**

Fats, oils and grease (FOG) are a slippery gang that make their way into the wastewater system and wreak havoc in sewer pipes. Grease as a warm liquid may not appear harmful, but as the liquid cools in pipes, it solidifies and sticks to the inside, like a clogged artery. The buildup continues to grow and can fully clog the pipe, leading to expensive sewer back-ups. These backups can come straight into your home and cause some costly damage.

Blockages from FOG can cause back-ups and sanitary sewer overflows. They're stinky, a health risk and expensive.

Use of garbage disposals leads to more clogs!

Garbage disposals put additional grease into the pipes and food particles that can become trapped in existing grease deposits.

Trying to Starve Us?

Well, it's working.

The easiest way to comply with regulations and maintain a clog-free sewer is to not use a garbage disposal at all.

Instead, place all remaining food particles and scraps into a trash or compost bin.



Tips to reduce FOG entering the sewer system

- Scrape or wipe grease into a sealable container. Seal and place in the trash.
- Collect liquid oils in an oil rendering tank
- Rotate cleaning schedule among fryers and food preparation devices
- Add anti-FOG practices to your clean-up tasks
- Prepare foods with minimal amounts of fats, oils and grease
- Educate family on the importance of reducing and preventing FOG

Get Out and Bike, Burnsville!



Summer may be on its way out, but there's still plenty of time to pedal! Biking is not only fun, but it's a low impact aerobic exercise that strengthens your leg muscles, works your core and contributes to a healthy lifestyle.

Bikes are also a terrific, eco-friendly way to get around! Bicycle riding is a pollution-free mode of transportation, so it's good for you and for the earth.

Burnsville is home to many bike trails, including hard and natural trails at many of our 76 parks and mountain bike trails at Terrace Oaks West Park.

Burnsville is also home to Minnesota Riverfront Park, which connects to the Minnesota River Greenway and offers spectacular views of the Minnesota River and the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge by bike.

Strap on your helmet and learn a bit more about the rules and etiquette of the trails.

How Do I Safely Bike Burnsville?

First step: always wear a helmet. When you're biking on a road with cars:

- Follow the law: obey all traffic signs and signals
- Ride in the same direction as traffic
- Ride as close to the right-hand curb or edge of the road as you can safely. Exceptions to this rule include when passing other vehicles or preparing to turn left
- Signal your turns, and watch for drivers who might not see you
- At night, use a head lamp and red reflector on the back of your bike

When you're biking on a multi-use trail:

- Always travel at safe speeds, taking into account weather conditions and other trail users
- Yield to pedestrians and others travelling more slowly than you
- Pass on the left, and announce your presence by saying "on your left"

or using a bell

Are electric bikes allowed on bike trails?

Yes! Most electric bikes may be ridden on any bike path, lane or shared use path where bicycles are allowed. Electric bikes are also street legal, so riders should follow the same rules of the road that apply to human-powered bicycles when biking on city streets.

I heard there are some new MN bike laws. What are they?

- Bicyclists may now cross an intersection from the left most side of a right-hand turn lane
- Cyclists may now treat a stop sign as a yield that is, they must slow to a speed that allows for stopping before entering a crosswalk or intersection. If the way is clear, they may proceed without coming to a complete stop



Burnsville offers a variety of resources and financial assistance programs to help you get started.

Burnsville Home Improvement Loans

Burnsville residents benefit from low rates and flexible terms with these direct loans for housing maintenance and repairs for owner-occupied



Loan amount: \$20,000 - \$50,000Term: 10 - 20 years Interest rate: 3% (3.247% APR)

Burnsville Senior Home Improvement Loans

This loan program is similar to the program above but specifically for residents ages 65 and older. While the CEE is also the lender for this program, it differs in the size of the loan available and the ability to defer repayment. Closing costs and income limits apply.

Loan amount: \$10,000 - \$15,000 Interest rate: 2%

Term: Deferred for a period of 30 years or when borrower sells, transfers title or the home is no longer the primary residence of the borrower.

Additional Home Improvement Programs:

- Burnsville Code Cash: Provides matching grant funds up to \$2,000 to help residents remedy minor property code violations. You must have received a City-issued code violation notice to apply.
- Community Development Agency (CDA) Weatherization Assistance: Dakota County residents can apply for a grant to assist in making their home more energy efficient with improvements such as insulating attics and walls, replacing inefficient appliances and making other health or safety improvements. Available through the Dakota County Community Development Agency at dakotacda.org or 651-675-4465.
- Dakota County CDA Homeownership Programs: The Dakota County CDA also offers programs for first-time homebuyers, homebuyer education, mortgage foreclosure and home improvement loans. Call 651-675-4400 to learn more or visit <u>dakotacda.org/housing-resources</u>.
- Minnesota Housing Finance Agency (MHFA) Fix Up Fund: This statewide program assists residents with limited incomes to make permanent home improvements including electric vehicle charging stations. Going Green the Greens

If you're looking for a scenic course with a commitment to sustainability and environmental stewardship, schedule a tee time at Birnamwood Golf Course.

Birnamwood Golf Course has long been a cherished spot for golf enthusiasts, but it's also a beacon of sustainability and environmental stewardship. The course is not only a place to enjoy a round of golf but also a thriving natural habitat, thanks to the tireless efforts of staff dedicated to making it a greener, more sustainable space.

Resilient and Resourceful Gardening

A key aspect of Birnamwood's sustainability efforts is its resilient and resourceful gardening practices. With the help of a seasonal master gardener and volunteers, the course has expanded its natural areas and implemented low-maintenance landscaping. This approach requires less fuel, chemicals and human resources.

Plants are split and reused elsewhere on the course when necessary, and plants no longer needed at other City landscaping projects are given a new home at Birnamwood. While milkweed is typically considered a weed, staff keep it around until monarch butterfly season is over. Golf Course Superintendent Dan Rootes shares, "We're working towards helping out our


pollinators as much as we can." On your next round, be sure to spot the blue birds, butterflies and bumble bees!

Another example of the golf course doing its part is the practice of not spraying chemicals around bodies of water. The pond may not have any fish, but animals like ducks and turtles call it home. And, for every tree removed, a variety of four to five new trees, native to Minnesota, are planted in its place, enhancing environmental resiliency.

Grow Burnsville Spin-Off

Inspired by the Grow Burnsville initiative, which includes a Food Forest and a Market Garden located on the Civic Center campus, Birnamwood began thinking of ways to expand these ideas onto the course. Sweet potatoes are planted along hole one, while chokecherry and elderberry bushes surround the pond. Honeycrisp and





Macintosh apple trees on hole four provide a perfect snack break for golfers. When harvest season comes around, produce is given away to golfers and is available to neighbors who stop by.

Audubon Certification

For the past 22 years, Birnamwood Golf Course has earned and held an Audubon International Certification for its work to preserve our natural resources. As a certified wildlife sanctuary, course staff regularly report on wildlife sightings. As part of the Audubon program, Birnamwood staffers test standing water, monitor chemical and pesticide usage and storage, implement a chemical risk management plan, provide outreach and education to

promote environmental stewardship to golfers, City staff and the community among other important program components.

So go enjoy a great round of golf, but don't forget to take in the beauty and benefits of a course dedicated to going green on the greens.
